Architectural/Historic Survey of Plainfield's Urban Core

Why is this person staring at my house?

The Village of Plainfield has hired ArchiSearch Historic Preservation Consultants to conduct a survey of historic buildings within Plainfield's Urbanized Core.

What is Plainfield's Urbanized Core?

The boundaries of the survey area are the EJ&E Railroad and the DuPage River (to the west); northeasterly to Mill Street; easterly to Eastern Avenue and the EJ&E Railroad; southerly to Lake Renwick and the Plainfield Township Cemetery; and westerly along Fort Beggs Drive to the Elgin Joliet and Eastern Railroad. This area is anticipated to consist of approximately five hundred twenty-five (525) properties.

Why do we need this survey?

The Village of Plainfield has been growing rapidly in the last decade. This survey will give us a record of our historic buildings and neighborhoods. The information will assist the Village in considering the protection and improvement of the urbanized core when planning projects. Additionally, the survey will help increase public understanding of and interest in the area's history and how that history is reflected in its architecture.

How will the survey be conducted?

The project is being overseen by the Plainfield Historic Preservation Commission and the Plainfield Community Development Department. From August through November 2005, ArchiSearch Historic Preservation Consultants from Urbana will survey buildings, walking through the Village, taking notes and photographs. The consultants will also conduct library research and talk with local historians. A survey form will be produced on each building within the survey area. **If you have any information on your building(s), we would greatly appreciate your sharing that with us.**

What's on this form?

Information includes an estimated date of construction, style, materials, building form and features, outbuildings (typically a garage), and physical changes to the building. Also included is an evaluation for possible National Register listing and local designation, either individually or within a historic district.

Will anyone be on my property? Will I have to let anyone into my house?

Absolutely not! The consultants will remain on public property at all times. You will not have to invite anyone into your house; access to private property is not part of this project.

Will my taxes be affected by the information gathered on the survey form?

No. This architectural/historic survey is a completely separate process from, and has nothing to do with, property assessments.
